Dr. Carter G. Woodson Father of Black History

We owe the celebration of Black History Month, and, the study of black history, to Dr. Carter G. Woodson. Born to parents who were former slaves, he earned a Ph.D. from Harvard. He was disturbed to find in his studies that history books largely ignored the black American population—and when blacks did figure into the picture, it was generally in ways that reflected the inferior social position they were assigned at the time.

Woodson decided to take on the challenge of writing black Americans into the nation's history. He established the Association for the Study of Afro-American Life and History. In 1926, he launched Negro History Week to bring national attention to the contributions of black people throughout American history.



Beverley Morgan-Sandoz Discusses the Commission on the Status of Women

Who is Beverley Morgan-Sandoz? Describe your achievements or contributions:

Response: I'm a resident of Pasadena, CA by way of Los Angeles, San Francisco, Chicago, and Cincinnati. I am a graduate from the University of Chicago, School of Social Service Administration. My professional life has been spent planning and administering programs that serve women and their families, with a focus on young children. A major achievement

was that I directed a national study on services to families with developmentally disabled children. This resulted in a report with recommendations to the Federal government. I served on a California State committee, having been appointed by the then Governor.

I'm a mother, an aunt, a sister, an AKA. My deceased husband was Judge John H. Sandoz, known for his compassionate judgments and decision-making. I was appointed to the **Commission on the Status of Women (CSW)** by Councilmember Tyron Hampton and was elected Chair in August 2020.

What inspired you to join the CSW? Services? Reason to support CSW?

Response: The desire to give back. There's a saying "bloom where you're planted." I took this to mean, do good, and contribute where you are. The Commission's mission to advise the City Council on the special needs and concerns of women of all ages, races, religions, ethnic and cultural backgrounds, and economic and social circumstances, is something I am passionate about.

Commission's achievements?

Response: We are an advisory body with limited funds. Our accomplishments result for our commitment, volunteer efforts and the support of the community. Some of our achievements include:

- A resolution presented to and adopted by City Council that recognized the goals of the United Nations Convention on the Elimination of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW)
- Survival Guide listing services in Pasadena.
- Recognition of Women's achievements through Herstory, an
 event open to the public. This year's event (which will be virtual,
 is scheduled for April 21 and will focus on strategies to assist
 women in obtaining appointments to Boards and Commissions
 and in running for public office. We seek women's groups as
 sponsors for the event.
- A 2015 report on the status of women in Pasadena. We are in the process of seeking to update the report, which will be done in collaboration with Mount Saint Mary's University.

Why support the Commission?

Response: We are the only Commission specifically targeted to identify and provide recommendations on issues effecting women. Each City Council member appoints one Commissioner and the mayor appoints two for a total of nine. SGV-NCNW is developing a Leadership Institute

to assist those interested in serving on various Commissions and Boards.

The Commission identifies hot topics and then seeks experts to provide information. The information enlightens Commissioners and supports any recommendations we might make.

Hot topics identified for 2021 include:

- 1. Human trafficking
- Strategies for engaging young girls and young women in decisionmaking
- 3. Domestic Violence and Homelessness
- 4. Access to the informational/digital divide
- 5. Wage equity
- 6. COVID 19
- 7. Police Oversight Commission

Most surprising about the Commission?

Response: How dedicated the Commissioners are and how much can be achieved with limited funds.

Commission's biggest challenges?

Response: We, Commissioners, have to recognize the limitations of the Commission. We do not provide direct services. We recommend, not implement. It's difficult when you see a problem not to want to solve it right away. For example, we had a presentation on homelessness. We all wanted to help with the count, find out why people were homeless, create more low-income housing etc. But these actions are outside our scope. What we can do is hear from organizations and formulate recommendations for the Council and we ask Departments to tell us how they are meeting the need, thus helping to hold the city accountable.

What should people know about the Commission?

Response: The meetings are open to the public (now virtual). The meetings are the first Wednesday of each month and begin at 6 PM. The public can address the Commission on issues on the agenda through the public comment procedure. There is an application process for appointment to the Commission. The City's Parks, Recreation and Community Services Department provides staff to the Commission.

What attracted you to NCNW?

Response: That's an interesting question. When I considered the name, I saw it as a throwback to an earlier time and wondered how relevant it could be to today's issues. But then I met women who were involved with the group and they were very much aware of today's issues and were forward thinking and action oriented. This was exciting to me. It changed my thinking and so I joined.

Partnerships between CSW and SGV-NCNW?

Response: Both NCNW and CSW are concerned about the community. Both organizations seek solutions to problems. We are aware of disparities and inequities and seek remedies to resolve them. We each encourage and promote civic engagement. The Commission is an example of this as we are appointed by elected officials and are tasked with providing them with recommendations to resolve issues.

CSW and SGV-NCNW are naturally partners.





Books by African American Authors - Worth Giving or Getting




Black Fortunes: Between the years of 1830 and 1927, as the last generation of blacks born into slavery was reaching maturity, a small group of industrious, tenacious, and daring men and women broke new ground to attain the highest levels of financial success (Recommended by Nadiyah Young)

National Youth Poet Laureate Amanda Gorman's powerful and historic poem "The Hill We Climb," read at President Joe Biden's inauguration, is now available as a collectible gift edition.

Coming September 21, 2021: **Change Sings** - A children's lyrical picture book debut from Amanda Gorman and #1 New York Times bestselling illustrator Loren Long. In this stirring, much-anticipated picture book, anything is possible when our voices join together. As a young girl leads a cast of characters on a musical journey, they learn that they have the power to make changes—big or small—in the world, in their communities, and in most importantly, in themselves.

The Vanishing Half (Fiction): Weaving together multiple strands and generations of this family, from the Deep South to California, from the 1950s to the 1990s, Brit Bennett produces a story that is at once a riveting, emotional family story and a brilliant exploration of the American history of passing. Looking well beyond issues of race, The Vanishing Half considers the lasting influence of the past as it shapes a person's decisions, desires, and expectations, and explores some of the multiple reasons and realms in which people sometimes feel pulled to live as something other than their origins. Sister to Sister Devotions: This powerful, best-selling book of meditations is a source of strength, renewal, healing, and celebration as readers share the contributors' stories of parenting, marriage, the death of a family member, and relationships in general. Suzan D. Johnson Cook captures the soul of sisters who need to tell their story. (Recommended by Betty Williams)

Wouldn't Take Nothing for My Journey Now: This is Maya Angelou, one of the best-loved authors of our time, talking from the heart, down to earth and real, but also inspiring. This is a book to be treasured, a book about being in all ways a woman, about living well, about the power of the word, and about the power of spirituality to move and shape your life. Passionate, lively, and lyrical, Maya Angelou's latest unforgettable work offers a gem of truth on every page. (Recommended by Betty Williams)

Higher Is Waiting: In this intimate book of inspiration, Tyler Perry writes of how his faith has sustained him in hard times, centered him in good times, and enriched his life. It is a spiritual guidebook, a collection of teachings culled from the experiences of a lifetime, meant to inspire readers to climb higher in their own lives and pull themselves up to a better, more fulfilling place. A Promised Land: In this first volume of his presidential memoirs, Barack Obama tells the story of his improbable odyssey from young man searching for his identity to leader of the free world, describing in strikingly personal detail both his political education and the landmark moments of the first term of his historic presidency—a time of dramatic transformation and turmoil.

Caste: Isabel Wilkerson gives us a masterful portrait of an unseen phenomenon in America as she explores, through an immersive, deeply researched narrative and stories about real people, how America today and throughout its history has been shaped by a hidden caste system, a rigid hierarchy of human rankings. 


